

Committee meetings

HUD requires grantees to develop an action plan before it will release funding





An action plan outlines the proposed use of Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds



HUD must approve the action plan before the grantee can draw down any federal funds



HUD identifies Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) areas for the grantees & requires that at least 80% of the CDBG-DR funds are spent in these areas



HUD Designated Most Impacted & Distressed Area

North Carolina's draft HUD Action Plan proposes distributing incoming funds to a range of programs across three main recovery areas HUD Grantees must address three areas of recovery with their Action Plan:







North Carolina proposes to spend the majority of its funding in housing and the rest to support community infrastructure (e.g., rebuilding of downtowns) and economic support (e.g., small business grants)



The proposed funding breakdown allocates the majority to housing, with \$807M for owner-occupied unit reconstruction and rehabilitation






\$111M: Commercial district revitalization

Housing

- \$807M: Reconstruction and rehabilitation for owneroccupied units
- \$53M: Workforce housing for ownership
- \$191M: Small Rental R&R and Multifamily construction program



North Carolina is proposing 5 programs in its HUD Action Plan, including three for housing

Program		Description	Eligible geographic area
	Reconstruction and rehabilitation for owner-occupied units	Program will provide grants for reconstruction or rehabilitation of owner - occupied units seriously damaged or destroyed by the effects of Hurricane Helene.	Priority will be for seriously damaged or destroyed units in the HUD-defined Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) areas with the State-Identified MID areas having a secondary priority.
	Workforce housing for ownership	Fund construction of units for purchase by low- and moderate-income (LMI) households. ¹	Program will provide homeownership opportunities with 100% of funds to expended for construction of units to be purchased by LMI households.
	Small Rental R&R and Multifamily construction program	Small rental R&R: Grant for reconstruction/rehabilitation of small rental properties with seven or fewer units. Additional amounts available for mitigation and access activities	Small rental R&R: units in either MID area
			<u>Multifamily construction</u> : Projects must be units in either MID area
		<u>Multifamily construction</u> : Program will restore housing and promote new construction of multifamily housing in HUD-identified MID areas and will focus benefit on. Funding will be via competitive process. LMI groups by imposing affordability requirements on new construction	
	Community infrastructure program	Provides funding for infrastructure projects that will help impacted communities become more resilient to current and future natural hazards.	Eligible applicants (local governments) must be located in HUD or State-identified MID areas and projects will be required to document link to disaster recovery needs.
	Commercial district revitalization	Program will provide grants to local governments or non-profit organizations to carry out revitalization activities in areas covered by the Helene major disaster declaration (DR-4827-NC).	Eligible applicants (local governments or non- profit organizations) must be located in HUD or State-identified MID areas and projects will be required to document link to disaster recovery needs

	Western North Carolina Small Business Initiative II	FEMA Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA) Program	NC Shelter Trailer Program
Description	The Small Business Initiative provides grants to eligible businesses to help them recover from the impacts of Hurricane Helene	Recently extended through May 26, the TSA program provides interim housing solutions for residents displaced by Helene	The shelter trailer program offers temporary travel trailers for up to six months for eligible survivors whose homes cannot be occupied
Eligibility	Businesses with uninsured physical or economic damage from Helene and	Homeowners and renters can apply with FEMA until March 8, 2025	Homeowners and renters whose primary residences cannot be occupied due to damage from Helene and who are not receiving FEMA rental assistance funds
	2023 AGR <=\$2.5M can apply by February 21, 2025	FEMA reviews eligibility on a rolling basis to determine disaster survivors' continued participation in the program
